OLYMPIC MEDALS

From Chamonix in 1924 until St Moritz in 1928, the medal presentation ceremonies traditionally took place at the Games Closing Ceremony. Since 1932 in Lake Placid, the Olympic medals have been presented after each competition.

Today, many of the medals are presented at a special ceremony, generally in a historic place in the host city, decorated for the event. In Vancouver, 25 of the 86 presentations took place at BC Place in the heart of the city and 45 on the medal plaza at Whistler.

According to the [Olympic Charter](#)¹, the medal for first place must be gold coloured, with at least 6 grams of fine gold. The two other medals are silver, for second place, and bronze, for third. In addition, the names of the medallists are placed permanently on display in the main stadium in which the Olympic Games are held. At the last Winter Games in Vancouver (2010), the medals were 100mm in diameter and 6mm thick weighing between 500 grams to 576g depending on the medal.

In total, there were 615 medals struck for these 2010 Games and 399 for Paralympic Games. Some 2855kg of metal was used: 2.05kg of gold, 1950 silver and 903 copper. On the reverse side, the medals contain the official names of the Games in English and French, the official languages of Canada and the Olympic Movement, as well as Vancouver 2010's distinctive emblems and the name of the sport and the event the medal was awarded in.
